
Faith Formation classes are as follows:

Dear Parishioners.

Mend your ways. Encourage one another. Live in harmony and peace and the God of love and peace will be with you. 'II Cor 13:11

As we again enter into Ordinary Time within the Life of the Church, we celebrate the wondrous Solemnity of The Most Blessed Trinity: the belief that there are Three Divine persons, Father Son and Holy Spirit, contained in the One God-Head. Without going deeper, it may seem to some that we believe in "three gods", but as we know, that is not the truth of the Trinity. Three distinct persons with three distinct "functions", if you will, make up the Holy Trinity. The Father is best seen as the creator and sustainer of life. The Son, Jesus, is our Redeemer who shows us the path to the Father. The Holy Spirit is the power of God who enlivens faith within us and gives us the grace to live the faith.

The Trinity exists as three separate persons contained as One God. Greater minds then mine have attempted to explain the Trinity. But in the end, it is simply a mystery that at this time may be beyond our grasp. St. Patrick of Ireland used the shamrock as a symbol of the relationship of the Trinity. While each leaf is separate and distinct they are also dependent on each other to make one plant. And so it is with the relationship of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit. They are three Persons yet depend on each other. That dependence is through the power of the love that flows through and in each. Confusing I know, so let us look to the Scriptures of the day for a better idea of what this means for our lives as believers. St. Paul exhorts us to live in a relationship of harmony and peace. That peace and harmony is the key to the Trinity. Peace and harmony come when we know that the path we are living is the one that God has chosen for us. The Gospel reminds us that God sent Jesus into the world so we may believe in Him and have eternal life. That faith in Jesus is embracing a way of life that calls us to a dependency on the God in Three Persons. When we give our lives to God we cannot help but want to share that love with one another. Certainly that means bearing witness to Jesus but also in the way we love each other as the Father, Son and Holy Spirit live out that love in their relationship. As all things for us as believers, love is the key. A love that is expressed in service and compassion. As separate as we are, it is love that binds us as ONE BODY. When we attempt this in our lives then, as St. Paul says, "The God of love and peace will be with us. 'So even if we cannot comprehend the mystery of the Most Blessed Trinity, we can surely attempt to live their example.

Fr. Anselm will be leaving at the end of the month. I would like to have a farewell reception for him on Sunday, June 26th after the 10:15 am Mass. Father Anselm will begin a new ministry as a Military Chaplain in our Armed Forces. While studying for his doctorate, Fr. Anselm incurred great expenses. That same weekend I would like to have a free will donation at all Masses to help with those expenses as well as to support the work for the poor in his Diocese. Thank you, Fr. Anselm!

SUNDAY, JUNE 19: MOST HOLY TRINITY

Fathers come in all shapes and sizes; some are strict, others lenient; some are very present in the lives of their children, others absent; some have left inspiring legacies for their children; others have left scars; some mean well, others do well. Children and fathers expect a lot from each other. Fathers: Do your best to make yourself known to your children; above all be kind and merciful to your sons and daughters. Children: Do your best to embrace the life given to you; above all be understanding and forgiving of your father's shortcomings.

MONDAY, JUNE 20

World Refugee Day is hard to "celebrate" because the situation of refugees—the conditions that led them to flee their homelands and the hardships they face in exile—is anything but good. As we honor this day, let us take seriously the words of United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees, António Guterres: "On this World Refugee Day, I ask you to help us help refugees find a place to call home." How can your family or parish or workplace tend to the plight of refugees? How might you partner with the U.N.'s agency on refugees, Catholic Charities, or other organizations that help refugees? How can you be a person of hospitality to those who may spiritually or physically be at a loss for a place to call home?

TUESDAY, JUNE 21 FEAST OF ALOYSIUS GONZAGA

Later in life a man recalled with fondness his last year at a Jesuit university when he lived in a student community named Gonzaga Hall. While not strictly religious or a house of formation, the community offered students many opportunities for spiritual development and faith-sharing. Curious to know more about the saint behind the name, the man learned that the 16th-century Italian Jesuit who impressed so many by his sanctity had died at the tender age of 23—the same age at which the man graduated from Gonzaga Hall. We tend to take longevity for granted, when it is in fact a great gift. But keep in mind the saying: "From those to whom much has been given, much is expected." Make the most of your time and leave a legacy for the ages.

WEDNESDAY, JUNE 22

It's an unfortunate fact of modern life that it's difficult to trust those in leadership. It is now clear that some of our leaders resort to deception and

concealment of what's really going on to further their own ends or those of the institutions they represent. The biblical tradition, however, offers a reliable guide to tell whether what we're being told is the real deal. Do leaders actually end up doing what they say they were going to do? Do people get to a better place because they followed a particular leader? It may take some time, but outcomes always reveal true intentions. Place your trust in leaders who actually deserve it.

THURSDAY, JUNE 23

A how-to website boasts: "You need not be an expert on anything to speak with authority. All you need is a great attitude, friendly demeanor, and a strong voice." We might wonder if Jesus knew the drill when at the end of his Sermon on the Mount the crowds were amazed because he spoke with authority. Jesus' authority did not come from a personal coach or because he could work a crowd, nor did it come only from an ability to cite the great spiritual masters of his people. It came from within, from his relationship with God. Our inner authority should come from the same place, but it's easy to give over that authority to an attractive face, friendly demeanor, or a loud voice. Listen to your heart before you attempt to speak with authority or allow others to do so on your behalf.

FRIDAY, JUNE 24: JOHN THE BAPTIST

In the Rite of Baptism the first question the priest or deacon asks is: "What name do you give this child?" At first glance this seems like a superficial question; a way to get the ball rolling as it were. But like all the elements of the sacrament of Baptism, there is more here than meets the eye. To give someone or something a name is a powerful act. As God named each part of creation as it was brought into being, so do we. Take some time today to think about the story of your name. Whom were you named after? What qualities did the person have that your parents may: have wished for you?

SATURDAY, JUNE 25: BLESSED VIRGIN MARY

The house was small, so small you could see through it at a glance. An older woman lay on a pallet off the main room. It was not convenient to have her there; it was even less convenient that a pair of useful hands was out of service in the household. Peter's wife needed her mother to help with the chores, the children—especially with Peter gone so much. If she was lost to this fever, as the elderly often were, it would be even worse. Jesus took all of this in at a glance. Everywhere Jesus goes, a little story of need emerges. If invited in, he always reaches out his hand.
