





food, rent and utility bills.



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Dear Parishioners,

"Anyone who eats my Flesh and drinks my Blood has Eternal Life" Jn 6:54

a ast week we celebrated the Solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity, which is not meant to simply be explained, but rather encountered as mystery. A mystery that is meant to be pondered to draw us into the mystery of God. Today we celebrate another Solemnity that is meant more to be pondered that explained. This Solemnity of Corpus Christi, or the Body and Blood of Christ, doesn't need theological explanations; they will never be enough. What we need is faith and trust. Trust that the Word of Jesus is true. As we hear in the Gospel today Jesus is telling His listeners that "Unless you eat the flesh and drink the Blood of the Son of Man you will not have Eternal Life." Many Christians believe that Jesus was speaking metaphorically and not literally about His Body and Blood but rather to feed on the "Word" that Jesus came to preach. While the Word is certainly important and that understanding would be easier to accept it is certainly NOT what Jesus was saying. If it were, He would have clarified His teaching when many who could not accept it turned away. What Jesus says is to reiterate more strongly His words and this teaching. After many leave Him, He turns to the Apostles and says "Will you leave me too?" This would have been the opportune time to explain a different teaching to His Disciples so they would understand more clearly. Yet there is nothing. So we conclude from this teaching and others in the Scriptures that Jesus wants to give us His very Self as food for our journey. This teaching has be believed from the earliest times in the life of the Church. We share this continual believe in the Real and True presence of Jesus in the Eucharist with our Orthodox sisters and brothers. As the Churches founded by Jesus we have kept faithful to this beautiful yet difficult teaching.

Like the Trinity, we again encounter mystery. Theologians have attempted to help us grasp this mystery through the teaching of Transubstantiation. This states that the accidents (external presence) remains the same but its substance changes into the Body and Blood of Jesus. So bread still looks and tastes like bread but is reality the Body of Christ. The same would be true for the accidents of the wine and its change into the Blood of our Lord.

Again, this is helpful but falls short of the beauty of what Jesus intends. What we need is faith to see past the accidents and to believe what Jesus intends. Faith acknowledges this great and wondrous Sacrament so that He may become part of us as food for our journey and that hopefully we become what we eat and drink...namely more like Jesus Himself.

So what do we believe? After the priest calls down the Holy Spirit on the gifts of bread and wine they truly BECOME the Body, Blood, Soul and Divinity of Jesus Himself. Not a symbol, not a mirror of something else, BUT Jesus Himself. Have you ever pondered while walking up to communion that you will cradle in your hands or on your tongue the true Body and Blood of our Savior? This awesome and humbling gift is Jesus' abiding presence to us.

We come to Mass to receive Jesus as Savior and Lord. The changes in the Liturgy will refocus us to continue to acknowledge Jesus as Lord and to remind us that we gather to worship this wondrous presence among us. May we stand in awe at this mystery, BUT more importantly may it cause us to seek Jesus and become more like Him whom we consume.

Fr. Anselm leaves us at the end of the month to begin his preparations to serve as Chaplain in our Military. I would like to thank him for the many gifts he shared so freely with our parish and for the personal assistance he offered me. Fr. Anselm will be greatly missed, and I wish him all the best as he ministers to the need of the men and woman who serve our nation in the military. Please join us after the 10:15 Mass this weekend for a farewell party for Fr. Anselm.

You all should have received a letter from me in regard to the Feasibility study and explaining the process. As I mentioned at the Masses this past weekend, we are only in the discussion stage of the renovation. We move forward only with the support of the parish. Please makes yourselves available to **Lynch Development**, so that they may assist us in this process. I would like to thank all those who attended the Town Meetings these last 2 weeks.

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Take Five for Faith Daily renewal for busy Catholics

SUNDAY, JUNE 26: Body and Blood of Christ

When the Israelites stood on the verge of entering the Promised Land, Moses, who was standing at the end of his life, told them not to forget the God who had led them out of slavery and sustained their lives in the desert. Saint Paul also had a reminder when he wrote the Corinthians not to forget that their sharing in the bread and wine made them one. And Jesus reminded his hearers that partaking of his body and blood led to eternal life. On a day such as today, when we celebrate something as familiar to us as the sacramental presence of Christ, it's good to remember what it means.

MONDAY, JUNE 27: Feast of Cyril of Alexandria

We proudly claim to be rugged individualists. Surely the joy of the American experiment is that we can be whatever we want, try new things, reinvent ourselves more than once along the way. Yet we don't exist alone on this planet, nor do we live without meaningful commitments and obligations to others. As Saint Cyril said: "By nature, each one of us is enclosed in his own personality, but supernaturally, we are all one." If we follow Jesus, we bind ourselves to his way. If we emphasize our relationship to more worldly things, we are bound to those instead.

TUESDAY, JUNE 28

The world has seen its share of disasters, both natural and of human origin: earthquakes, floods, hurricanes, tornadoes, oil spills, and wars, to name a few. People also experience their own personal catastrophes: illnesses, deaths, losses of jobs and homes, the crumbling of families and relationships. Such events can give us some perspective on biblical stories like the one about the sleeping Jesus and his scared-todeath disciples on a storm-tossed boat. It can be hard to trust God—or anyone for that matter—when events threaten to overcome us. It is at those times, though, that trust is most needed. Take some biblical advice. Jesus "rebuked the winds and the sea, and there was great calm." In the face of calamity, the voice of God is not in the sound and fury but in the stillness of your heart.

WEDNESDAY, JUNE 29: Sts. Peter and Paul

Saints Peter and Paul are forever linked as key figures in the success of the newborn Christian way. It's unlikely, however, that there will ever be a buddy flick about them. Peter was one of the first apostles

called, and Paul the last; Paul was an educated Pharisee, Peter probably illiterate; Peter was a companion of Jesus, Paul never knew Jesus until after the Resurrection. The thing that linked Peter and Paul was their passion to tell the world the good news about Jesus. Oh, and both of these pillars were flawed by bad choices, stubbornness, disloyalty, hotheadedness. Peter and Paul were made saints by God's grace, just as you and I will be if we commit ourselves entirely to Jesus and his mission.

THURSDAY, JUNE 30

Paralysis takes two forms: physical and spiritual. Spiritual paralysis prevents us from moving forward, speaking out and speaking up, saying or doing what we know is right. All we have to do is look around at the unprecedented shape our country is in—fighting two wars, at a time of high unemployment, with an over-extended budget that leaves no money for infrastructure, healthcare, or education—to know that paralysis is epidemic in the United States. Today is a good day to pray that our world leaders, elected officials, and we ourselves may be healed of our spiritual standstill.

FRIDAY, JULY 1: Most Sacred Heart of Jesus

Devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus emphasizes the long-suffering love and compassion of Christ toward all humanity. Compassion is the sum of wisdom and grace. If we choose to embrace it as our guiding principle, it can point the way to a generous and virtuous life. A litany to the Sacred Heart includes the following lines—perhaps you will want to make them your own today: "Heart of Jesus, house of God and gate of heaven. / Heart of Jesus, glowing furnace of charity. / Heart of Jesus, vessel of justice and love. / Heart of Jesus, full of goodness and love. / / Heart of Jesus, most worthy of all praise."

SATURDAY, JULY 2: Immaculate Heart of Mary

The word *immaculate* means "clean"—more specifically "without flaw." The church calls the heart of the Blessed Virgin Mary immaculate because she was the mother of Jesus, who was without sin, the major human flaw. That's the theological reason. But how can we imitate such perfection? Humanity is anything but immaculate. Our limitations frequently point to our distance from divine perfection. What Mary had, though, is purity of heart: She always sought to understand, open herself to, and follow God's will for her. Her intention was to listen for God's intentions. While we may not be able to achieve Mary's perfection in responding to the promptings of God, we can imitate her willingness to seek God's desires for ourselves.
