



Dear Parishioners,

This week I will begin our discussion of the changes in the Roman Missal which will take effect the First Sunday of Advent, November 27, 2011.

Ritual has always been a part of the Church's Liturgy. It stems from our roots in the Jewish Liturgy. The early Church followed the example of Jesus and read the stories of the Last Supper and broke bread and shared the cup as the everlasting memorial of Jesus' presence. In 1570, Pope Pius V issued the First Roman Missal. He collected all the prayers and rituals for the Latin Rite of the Catholic Church. This Missal has remained the same, except for some minor changes, for over 500 years. It wasn't till the reforms of the Second Vatican Council that any major changes took place. The Council Fathers and Blessed John XXXIII wished to reform the Church using pastoral guidelines. These changes brought about the movement of the language of Mass from Latin to the language of the people. The priest, in order to be seen as the one who leads prayer, now turned and faces the people.

Immediately following the Council, National Conferences began the process of translating the Latin text into the vernacular. In 1969, the first edition was created. This process continued and a second edition was promulgated in 1975. In the year 2000, Blessed John Paul II created the third edition of the Roman Missal. He added new prayers and the celebration of recently canonized saints. Blessed John Paul II asked the English speaking countries to begin the translation of these new prayers that would be in closer conjunction with the Latin. In 2010, Pope Benedict XVI approved the new translation that will take effect this Advent.

We have to remember that with this new translation or third edition of the Roman Missal, the Mass itself will not be changing. Some of the words and responses that we have grown accustomed to will be changed to reflect a better and closer translation from the Latin text. The English translation is one of the last to be done in the Universal Church and will now bring the English speaking Catholics in closer unity to the Mass celebrated throughout the world. The changes will certainly be confusing in the beginning, but the hope is that the new prayers will help raise our hearts to encounter the transcended God. It will be a great opportunity to re-evaluate how we come to celebrate Mass. It is an exciting time and I hope one that will bring us to a deeper renewal and love of the Mass.

Next week I will begin to explain some of the parts that will be changing and hopefully present the reasons for the changes.

As we enter summer please don't put aside worship. There are many activities and parties, but our worship of Jesus at Mass should always be a priority and one not taken lightly. # SUNDAY, JULY 10

What is the Word of God? Your first answer might be the Bible, and you would be right. The Word is how God communicates with us. It is also God's creativity at work in the world. # MONDAY, JULY 11: FEAST OF BENEDICT

When the patron saint of Kindle is finally considered, Saint Benedict should make the short list. In the fifth century he founded a community of monks so enamored of learning that they would dedicate themselves to the painstaking labor of copying books. Jesus walked from town to town unfolding the gospel in real time through his words and actions. The Benedictines did it one careful letter at a time. And not only scripture: The monks are credited with helping to save the civilization of Europe in their collection, protection, and transmission of classic manuscripts. Read a classic—paper optional.

### TUESDAY, JULY 12

Stories of, in, and with water abound in the Bible, and rightly so: Both our physical and faith lives begin with this amazing element. We are made of the stuff! What's more, we drink it, play in it, bathe and wash dishes in it, grow food with it, and travel on it, to name only a few of water's many uses. It's awesome to contemplate that the water we use today has been in existence since the beginning of time. That means the water in this morning's coffee may very well have been in a cloud over China last year or the river that held a basket containing a small child in Egypt thousands of years ago. Consider the precious gift of water today.

### WEDNESDAY, JULY 13: FEAST OF HENRY

Saint Henry (972-1024) was a German king who rose to the lofty position of Holy Roman Emperor back when there were such titles. He lived a chaste life and was a big supporter of church structure and reform at

a time of disarray and dissolution. A thousand years later the Roman emperors, holy or otherwise, are long gone but the church is still here and still in the process of reform. Henry played his part—how about us? Find a way to help your local parish or faith community grow stronger and more faithful to its best traditions so that a thousand years from now it will be there for others.

## THURSDAY, JULY 14


It makes a difference whether you know someone's name. To be introduced to a person involves learning their name. It puts you on personal terms. It was the same for the ancient Israelites, even when it came to God. When Moses asked God who he should say sent him, God revealed the divine name to Moses to tell the people. In this way they would know the Lord was *their* God, who cared for them and would act on their behalf. Call on the Lord by name and ask God to be active in your life.

## FRIDAY, JULY 15: FEAST OF BONAVENTURE

It was said of Saint Bonaventure (d. 1274): "To know him was to love him." As a matter of fact, his mentor and brother Franciscan Alexander of Hales said that Bonaventure seemed to have escaped the curse of Adam's sin, such a gentle man and gentleman was he. In our own day we can catch something of what made him so admired and loved: his passion that we be drawn to God. In his book *The Journey of the Mind into God*, Bonaventure calls our human pilgrimage an "ascent of the heart." He saw the universe itself as a ladder by which we may ascend to God. He was a philosopher, but he saw little distinction between the mind and the heart. His motto: "I shall study Thee solely to
