The Gospel of the Lord!

From the beginning, reading from one of the four gospels has been a high point of our Sunday assembling to give thanks and praise. For good reason, too. Christ comes to us in word as well as in deed, in the scriptures as well as in the sharing of his body and blood. And while we know that God speaks to us in all of holy scripture, at Mass we are most eager to hear the gospel, the good news of the very words and deeds of Jesus. (That is what the Old English word “gospel” means after all, “good news,” “God’s news.”) So when it is time, we jump to our feet. We acclaim the coming of the gospel with that most ancient and holy of words: Alleluia! (Unless it is Lent, our season of sorrow when we fast from our glorious word just like Israel in exile hung up its harps.) Fast to our feet, singing loud praise, we watch as the deacon (or the priest) takes up the Book of the Gospels. Accompanied by servers with candles, perhaps with fragrant clouds of incense from another server’s bowl, the Book of the Gospels makes its way through our assembly from altar to ambo. It sat on the altar from the start of Mass as a sign that Christ is present in the gospel. Now it is taken “up to the heights” to be proclaimed from the ambo, just as Jesus preached the sermon on the mount, or the apostles, drunk with the Holy Spirit, shouted joy from Jerusalem’s Pentecost rooftops. As the deacon announces that this is from Matthew or Mark, from Luke or John, we trace the sign of the cross on our foreheads (may we understand this good news!), on our lips (may we always speak and spread this good news!), and over our hearts (may we love and always live this good news!) Then we listen. We stand together and listen. We stand and listen like a servant being given orders, like an honored guest being whose deeds are recounted, like a convicted criminal before the judge’s bench, like the beloved being met in haste by the lover. And when it is spoken, when the last word for this day has sunk deep within, the deacon looks to us and says, “The gospel of the Lord!” to which we cry, “Praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ!” What else could we possibly say?

Take Five for Faith

Daily renewal for busy Catholics

Sunday, August 21

Poets can see the world through the eyes of a child. They are forever trying to get us to perceive the extraordinary in the ordinary: the outlines of bare trees in winter, the loveliness of a simple yellow rose, or the way a late afternoon shadow falls on a wall. We don't often see these daily miracles without prompting; their very familiarity renders them all but invisible. As the poet John Donne observed, "Nay, the ordinary things in Nature would be greater miracles than the extraordinary . . . if they were done but once." Being a grown-up doesn't have to mean we're hopelessly blind. Today, ask God for the gift of wonder and awe.

Monday, August 22

Idolatry—the worship of false gods—gets a lot of attention in scripture. Turning to other gods than God was about the worst thing the Israelites could do. Jesus spoke out about it, too, and reserved some of his harshest language for the Pharisees and scribes who valued the gold of the Temple more than the One whom the Temple wealth was supposed to serve. In other words, they made an idol out of money by putting it ahead of God. Do you have idols in your life? What is between you and God? Take some time to examine your life and if necessary rearrange your priorities.

Tuesday, August 23: Feast of Rose of Lima

Saint Rose, who lived in Lima, Peru some 400 years ago, is considered patron saint of the resolution of family quarrels. To live the ascetic life she desired, she herself had to struggle against her family's wishes. Given the degree of family strife we hear about, witness, or perhaps even experience ourselves, no saint could be more timely for our troubled age of fractured families. One sees the evidence of wounded families at every turn—in crime and drug abuse, prison populations, among friends and acquaintances. Perhaps we, too, in our own small way, can be a "patron of family healing." Reach out to a hurting friend or relative—perhaps under your own roof—with prayer and compassion.

Wednesday, August 24: Feast of Bartholomew

For all the airtime the 12 apostles receive, there are some we know precious little about! Saint Bartholomew, for example, is mentioned only four times in the Bible as merely a line item in the list of apostles. But don't let that fool you into thinking that

our veneration of Bartholomew is misplaced. While tales of healing and conversion, mission trips and heroic faith are great sources of inspiration, there is also a place for the many apostles and disciples who lived faithfully yet in relative obscurity. They remind us that our own hidden acts of kindness, personal sacrifices, quiet prayers, and humble works are infinitely valuable in the kingdom of God.

Thursday, August 25: Feast of Joseph Calasanz

How do you determine how well you're doing? By having the right friends? Saint Joseph Calasanz was friends with Galileo—not a good idea at that time in the church. He was also well-born but renounced his inheritance in favor of the priesthood. Founding a community for the education of poor children, he was accused of causing social unrest by encouraging the underclasses to seek better for themselves. Considered incompetent, Joseph was removed as superior and lived to see his order, the Piarists, dissolved by the pope. After his death the order was reborn and continues its good work today. The measure of our lives is more than meets the eye.

Friday, August 26

Whether it's Harold Camping and his followers who were ready to be raptured on May 21, 2011 or those who believe the so-called winding down of the Mayan calendar in December will trigger cosmic cataclysm, some people see the need to set a precise date for the end of the world. For Christians, however, the exact scheduling of The End flies in the face of Jesus' own words on the subject: "Stay awake, for you know neither the day nor the hour" (Matt. 25:13). It also ignores the fact that in a sense he *never left*: He has been, is, and will be with his people until the end of the age. If you are attentive to Christ's presence in each and every hour, you'll be ready when The Hour rolls around.

Saturday, August 27: Feast of Monica

Monica is the patron of mothers of difficult children. As the mother of Saint Augustine she knew more than a little about the subject. She followed her wayward son from Carthage to Rome and Milan, all the while weeping and begging him to reform his ways. She also prayed—a lot. We know the story ends happily: Augustine was baptized and became one of the most influential thinkers in all of Christian history. Yet even Monica would probably admit it was not her crying and cajoling that helped turn her son around. It was her prayers. Being a parent is hard, to put it mildly. If you are struggling with an errant child, take a page from Monica's book and pray—a lot.
