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# **Diocesan Pilgrimage to the 50<sup>th</sup> Eucharistic Congress** Dublin, Ireland June 4 - 13, 2012

The Diocese of Rockville Centre is sponsoring this pilgrimage under the leadership of Bishop John C. Dunne, auxiliary Bishop of our Diocese. Msgr. Jim McNamara, pastor at Holy Cross Church in Nesconset, is coordinating the pilgrimage events. This pilgrimage is open to everyone.

Our pilgrimage will begin with the western part of Ireland and will end with the first three days of the Eucharistic Congress. Since Bishop Dunne's parents came from Castlebar, we are designing this pilgrimage around his family roots in the west of Ireland. This will enable us to visit some well-known sites (like the Cliffs of Moher and Kylemore Abbey) and other places of interest that will introduce us to the richness of Irish culture and heritage. We will celebrate Mass each day including at the Cathedral in Tuam and Knock. The pilgrimage begins on Monday, June 4 with a flight from JFK to Shannon airport. After some relaxing days in the west of Ireland and a visit to the shrine of Our Lady of Knock, the highlight of the pilgrimage will be the beginning of the Eucharistic Congress on Sunday, June 10<sup>th</sup> with the opening Mass. The theme on Monday is exploring and celebrating our Communion through the Sacrament of Baptism. Tuesday's theme will be exploring and celebrating the Communion of Marriage and Family. Unless you wish to stay longer, our pilgrimage group will return to JFK from Dublin on Wednesday, June 13th. There will also be an option to come for only the Eucharistic Congress portion in Dublin (departure from New York JFK June 9<sup>th</sup>) and then go off on your own to visit relatives or explore Ireland.

#### Dear Parishioners,

#### "A Savior has been born to you, who is Christ and Lord" Lk 2:13

How often do we hear that Christmas doesn't feel like it used to feel? Something is missing in our experience that robs us of the joy that this day is meant to convey. I suggest that maybe our focus needs a little readjustment. The celebration of Christmas began around the time of Halloween and certainly is geared up by the day after Thanksgiving. We have seen the decorations and Christmas carols have been ringing in our ears. The secular world describes Christmas as a time of gift-giving, reaching out to the poor and the gathering of family. The sentiments are heartwarming and centered around themes and stories that at the same time bring a tear to our eyes and cause our hearts to become uplifted. While these things are all true and CAN be part of the Christmas celebration, they are secondary to the meaning of this holy season. I dare say our

problems may be that we have reversed the "cause and effect" of Christmas. We act and do all the "traditional" activities of Christmas because it is the Birth of Jesus. Without Jesus, this holiday can just be reduced another money maker for the retailers and greeting card manufacturers. Even the very name is often removed. Merry Christmas is replaced with Happy Holidays and the Christmas Tree has become simply "the Tree Lighting." I am finding this even in Christian circles. As I said, without Jesus it just becomes another holiday. But we, my sisters and brothers, have something even more wonderful. We know that what we celebrate is the coming of the Prince of Peace into our world. Jesus, born of Mary, has reminded us "that God is with us." This is the "Cause" of the celebrating. What we do from that acknowledging the Lordship of Jesus is the "Effect" of how we respond. So gift-giving, taking care of the poor and gathering with family are wonderful opportunities BUT we have to remember it is in the Name of Jesus that for us, all these things happen. The Church has been celebrating Advent these last 4 weeks. Our hearts have been hearing the words of St. John the Baptist "Prepare the way of the Lord." The call has been one of introspection, looking at our lives and evaluating how well we have embraced the Gospel of Jesus. St. John reminds the people and us, that to receive Jesus we need to repent from our sins and find joy in the forgiveness that Jesus offers us in the Sacrament of Reconciliation. When we re-direct our focus to the Birth of Jesus as the sign of God's tremendous love for us, then this celebration can take on a whole new and certainly a deeper meaning. The joy of this day is not dependent on how many gifts we have given or received, or how well behaved our family is on Christmas Day. We have something more permanent and life changing.... we have JESUS.

The secular world can certainly help put us in a Christmas mood but it is faith that puts flesh on it. Remember even though the world has had the trappings of Christmas for some time, for us as Catholics, the day begins today. We celebrate Christmas in what we call the Octave (8 days). So for 8 days it is Christmas. And the seasons continues for a few more weeks. Maybe this year, try to really celebrate the feast **on** Christmas Day. Keep the Christmas tree and decorations up till the Epiphany (little Christmas), gaze at the Nativity Scene and ponder what God is saying to you. And maybe next year, hold back decorating till it is closer to Christmas (so you won't get so tired of the decorations) and enter into the Season of Advent. You may re-discover that lost joy for Christmas.

I would like to thank all the ministers in our parish who give so much of themselves throughout the year. We have over 45 ministries here at St. Boniface filled with people who have responded "yes" to serve Jesus by serving the parish. It is my privilege and pleasure, as pastor, to witness all the good that is done in the Name of Jesus. A special thanks to all who helped decorate our church, for the ministers at this Mass and to each of you. I am certainly blessed to serve as your brother and priest.

On behalf of myself, Fr. Azubuike and the entire Staff here at St Boniface Martyr, we wish you and your families a very blessed and joyful Christmas.

Our Parish Campaign to "Renew and Restore the House of God" continues. Please see our insert. I continue to ask all families, if you have not already done so, to consider being a part of this important parish endeavor. We need to prepare our Church building for the future, so that the building may assist us in expressing how we worship; to help cut costs that will realize us a savings each year and to adapt to the changing needs of those in our parish. With the support of many this becomes a true expression of our parish life. If any of our volunteers call you to make an appointment to talk about the Campaign, I ask you to welcome them into your homes as your brothers and sisters in faith. 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#### Sunday, December 25, 2011

One year during Saint Francis of Assisi's life, Christmas fell on a Friday. Knowing the holy man's love of fasting in imitation of Jesus, the brothers asked Francis if he wished them to fast even though it was Christmas. "Fast?" Francis replied. "How can we fast on the feast of the Lord's birth? Rather we should smear the walls with meat!" Obviously not a vegetarian, and perhaps prompting a little queasiness in his hearers, Francis' point was that in celebrating the God-who-becomesflesh even the walls rejoice! Nothing is held back from the God who held nothing back from us but who embraced our whole humanity. In your joy today, in your compassion, reconciliation, forgiveness, mercy, and justice, don't hold anything back.

#### Monday, December 26

#### Feast of Stephen, first martyr

What does it mean to be a martyr? Does it mean to be like Saint Stephen, willing to give your very life for what you believe? The root of *martyr* is "witness," and there are many ways we are called to testify to the gospel. These can be familiar but they are no less courageous than the path Stephen took. Being a good parent, a loving partner, honest in business dealings, compassionate—these are powerful forms of attesting to the Good News. How will you testify to the gospel with your life today? On this second day of Christmas let us pray for a spirit of courage for that witness not only in words but with our lives.

#### **Tuesday, December 27**

#### Feast of John, apostle, evangelist

Each of us has firsthand knowledge of the presence of Christ in the world. First and foremost, in the bread and wine of the Eucharist. But not only there: We've experienced Christ in the community of the church. We've encountered Christ in the grace of many sacraments and received from his tender hands the forgiveness of our sins. We've known the love of Christ in faithful marriages and felt his healing touch in times of sickness and despair. And daily, we see Christ in the eyes of the poor. On this third day of Christmas, imitate the memorable testimony of Saint John, and tell others about your own encounters with Christ.

#### Wednesday, December 28

#### Feast of the Holy Innocents, martyrs

King Herod's order to kill every male child in and around Bethlehem under the age of 2 is surely one of humanity's most terrible moments. It's a dark story for a dark time of year. Yet darkness, whether it belongs to the whole of humanity or resides in our own soul, has much to teach those who desire to deepen and grow spiritually. As the poet Pablo Neruda advises, "We need to sit on the rim / of the well of darkness / and fish for fallen light / with patience." On this fourth day of Christmas, let us pray for the gift of compassion and courage to explore our shadow-side so that its influence on our actions might be diminished and our inner light can shine more brightly.

#### Thursday, December 29

#### Feast of Thomas Becket, bishop, martyr

In Catholic liturgy, a *col*-lect (stress on the first syllable) is a liturgical act that calls us to pray together in dialogue with the presider, as in the opening prayer of the Mass. From the website *CatholicCulture.org*, here is a collect we can pray together today, the fifth day of the Octave of Christmas, as we bring to mind Saint Thomas Becket, who died in defense of his faith: "O God, who gave the martyr Saint Thomas Becket the courage to give up his life for the sake of justice, grant, through his intercession, that, renouncing our life for the sake of Christ in this world, we may find it in heaven."

#### Friday, December 30 Feast of the Holy Family

For some of us, this late in the holiday season, the burden of family may just be starting to express itself. (Will this houseful of relatives ever leave?) Yet many also find themselves away from their homes or families for reasons not entirely under their control, ranging from military service, education, employment, illness, divorce, loss, or estrangement. For them even a slightly used and tarnished family would be better than none at all. On this sixth day of Christmas, share your heart and home by inviting someone in to enjoy the gift of belonging.

#### Saturday, December 31

Today, the close of the calendar year and the seventh and next-to-last day of the Christmas season, there is much to be grateful for. Perhaps the greatest source of thanksgiving is for the very gift of God's Son, whose coming into the world we are in the midst of celebrating. In the words of the Second Vatican Council, "God chose to reveal himself and to make known to us the hidden purpose of his will": Through Christ, the Word made flesh, and in the Holy Spirit, humanity would have access to the father and share in divine nature. Wow! God wants us to be divine, to share in God's very nature. Now that is a gift worth keeping and learning how to use.
