SUNDAY, JANUARY 6

SOLEMNITY OF THE EPIPHANY OF THE LORD

In the next month the church will celebrate three *epiphanies*—"manifestations"—of Jesus: Epiphany today, the Baptism of the Lord next Sunday, and the Presentation of the Lord on February 2. Each of these events reveals something about Jesus: that he is the Messiah, that he is God's beloved Son, and that he was consecrated from the beginning for his great task. What's more, these revelations about Christ say that God's salvation is for all. The world is not the enemy of the people of God; it's the fertile ground on which to build God's kingdom. In this Year of Faith when the church is calling for a "New Evangelization," and as a new year begins, what can you do to participate in this great mission?

MONDAY, JANUARY 7

Feast of Raymond of Peñafort, priest

In the 2,000-year history of the church, few people have had a longer lasting impact than Saint Raymond of Peñafort, whose effort back in 1230 to pull together the many legal traditions in the church into one unified body of work set the standard for canon law that has endured for nearly 800 years. Though it might seem like an esoteric topic far removed from your daily life, canon law helps shape the customs and traditions of the church. For example, we learn from canon law that the Christian faithful "are obliged to assist with the needs of the Church and to promote social justice and assist the poor from their own resources." And "sacred ministers are to hold the function of preaching in esteem since the people of God are first brought together by the word of the living God." TUESDAY, JANUARY 8

It must have been tempting for those closest to Jesus to let him do all the talking, deciding, praying, and healing. After all, he was the one with all the know-how and the power. Jesus was aware of that, of course, and so regularly encouraged his followers by telling them, for example, "Amen, amen, I say to you, whoever believes in me will do the works that I do, and will do greater ones than these" (John 14:12). Leaders can either empower or disempower. Today is a good day to consider how you guide your children, employees, students, team. Do you do things for them, or do you motivate and encourage them to try themselves?

WEDNESDAY, JANUARY 9

While we admire people who seem fearless, there is something humanizing about a movie-hero like Indiana Jones and his sheepish hatred (read: fear) of snakes. He makes us less-heroic types feel more accepting of our own fears and failures. But in the First Letter of John, what the writer presents as the opposite of fear is not courage, but *love*. In the afterglow of Christmas, we ought to remember again and again the truth Christmas impressed upon us: that God so loved the world. And to love one another, scripture reminds us, is to see the face of God incarnate.

THURSDAY, JANUARY 10

You may think that a strange question—various scripture passages say he did, and how could he not be able to do something that most schoolchildren in the U.S. today have learned by the age of 9 or 10? But that wasn't always the case; in fact for most of recorded history, being able to read and write was reserved to a small, elite segment of society. In the Roman Empire at the time Jesus lived, estimates say that only 3-10 percent of the population was literate. Judaism has always emphasized reading and study of the Torah, however, so it should not surprise us that Jesus likely could read—he certainly read the human heart with complete understanding. What does he find written on your heart?

FRIDAY, JANUARY 11

Even Jesus led a hectic life. Teaching at the synagogue one moment, healing the sick and broken-hearted at another, wrangling with crowds at still another. On top of that he was not exempt from the ordinary stuff of eating, sleeping, working, and the like just because he was God. Scripture makes no mention of an angelic personal assistant managing behind-the-biblical-scenes tasks for Jesus. What Jesus *did* have going for him was a commitment to prayer—an ability that fortunately is available to all of us. Jesus took time to pray, often withdrawing to a solitary place. It's not the easiest thing to find space in a demanding schedule, but we must also figure out ways to be alone with God.

SATURDAY, JANUARY 12

Human beings are obsessed with organizing knowledge. Great thinkers from Aristotle to Dewey and his decimal system to the folks at Google and Wikipedia have tackled the problem of how to organize all human data. We develop knowledge bases at our companies and attach labels to our contacts in LinkedIn. We alphabetize, number, and categorize every piece of information that passes our way. Our massive efforts to understand what we experience in the world are useful and fascinating, but in the end the most essential truth we know is: "God is love." Further, as Saint John points out in his First Epistle: "We know that we belong to God." File that away for future reference.

This Feast of the Epiphany is the continuation of the plan of God for the salvation of the world. The Magi sought Jesus and would not stop till they found Him. What a great metaphor for each of us. Our faith calls us to seek Jesus each and every day. To see, sense and feel His loving presence. A presence that beckons and invites us to the call of continuing conversion. May we seek Jesus each day and embrace the wisdom that I have seen on bumper stickers which says, "Wise men still seek Him."

⁶ Frankincense and Myrrh

Frankincense is a resin obtained by making a cut into the bark of a tree called Arbor Thuris. This causes a white, gummy substance to come out which becomes hard in a short time upon exposure to the air. It burns readily and gives out a definite and somewhat agreeable odor. The Hebrews used it by itself as well as mingled with other ingredients to make a pleasant smelling oil for anointing priests, and for use on some of the sacred furniture of the Tabernacle (Leviticus 24:70), and even within the Holy of Holies (Exodus 30:340). It was also burned as incense.

Myrrh is a substance obtained from a tree in the same manner as frankincense. It is mentioned in Exodus 30:22-33 as being, in liquid form, one of the ingredients of a "Holy anointing oil" with which the furniture within the Tabernacle



was anointed. The priests were also anointed this holy oil. The wood and bark of the tree which produces myrrh has a strong odor. Myrrh was sometimes used in the preparation of perfumes and in embalming the bodies of the dead. Like some other resins it has medicinal value, and ancient Greek physicians employed it as an external local remedy. Both myrrh and frankincense, together with a variety of spices, were brought to Palestine from Arabia. Both frankincense and myrrh are still in use today for medical purposes.

We are told in the Bible (Matthew 2:11) that "Wise Men from the East" brought to the baby Jesus in Bethlehem gifts of gold and frankincense and myrrh. These Wise Men were stargazers, possibly from a priestly caste in Media, and were skilled in astrology. Their journey from Media to Jerusalem may have followed the Arabian spice trade routes, and some scholars have thought it probable that they engaged in trading along the way, bringing to Bethlehem gifts from their precious cargo.

Some people like to think of frankincense, with its rising fragrant smoke, as symbolizing prayer lifted to God. Myrrh, bitter to the taste, is thought of as symbolizing the passion of Jesus.

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Bless Your Door on Epiphany

The gospel tells us that the magi found Christ "on entering the house." The door to your home is a holy threshold. You can bless those who come in and go out by inscribing above the door in chalk the first two numbers of the year+C+M+B+the last two numbers of the year. Tradition tells us that the letters stand for the names of the magi: Caspar, Melchior and Balthasar. Adolph Adam points out that it may also mean "Christus mansionem benedicat" or "May Christ bless this dwelling." It's appropriate to bless your door in January—janua means "door" and the first month is the door to the new year. After inscribing the doorway, say this prayer:

God of Bethlehem and Cana, God of Jordan's leaping waters, in baptism you bring us into your family. You wed us and embrace us as your beloved. May we fill this place with kindness to one another, with hospitality to guests, and with abundant care for every stranger.

> By the gentle light of a star, guide home all who seek you on paths of faith, hope and love. Then we will join the angels in proclaiming your praise: Glory in heaven and peace on earth, now and for ever. Amen.
