

The waning light, falling leaves, dying garden, and liturgical readings mirror

each other at this time of year, and our thoughts turn naturally toward the end times. The fact that we don't know exactly when death will come is a good thing because this "unknowing" is an incentive to really live our lives: to use time wisely, to tell people we love them, to hug our child, to perform a kindness, to let go of grudges and bitterness, to do what we know we were born to do. Today is a good day to remember you know neither the day nor the hour of your death—and begin to live accordingly.

⊕ <u>Monday, November 19</u>

You may know "Day by Day," the popular song from the 1970s musical *Godspell*. The refrain, which was adapted from a 13th-century English prayer, includes the lines: "Three things I pray: To see thee more clearly, love thee more dearly, follow thee more nearly." Those words pretty well summarize the yearning in the heart of all Christians. It begins with "seeing clearly" because it's hard to love or follow Jesus unless you do your best to focus on him and his message. The blind man who begged Jesus "Lord, please let me see" spoke for all of us. Spend a moment today reflecting on blind spots in your own faith areas where doubt, fear, ego, or simple neglect have carried the day thus far.

Zacchaeus the tax collector is the only person in the gospels who has their height mentioned. But in the end it is not for his smallness that Zacchaeus is remembered but the bigness, the boldness, and the determination of his desire to see Jesus and turn his life around. Doubtless Mr. Z.'s antics in climbing a tree got Jesus' attention, but what was really impressive was that desire for faith, so stunning that Jesus invites himself to the tax collector's house for dinner, bringing salvation along with him rather than a bottle of wine for the host. This Year of Faith is about getting closer to Jesus; to do that we don't need to climb a tree but to open the door from within to find Jesus eager to enter.

⊕ <u>Wednesday</u>, November 21

Feast of the Presentation of the Blessed Virgin Mary The story of the birth and childhood of the Virgin Mary did not make it into scripture, but the *Protevangelium* ("Pre-Gospel") *of James* was written to fill in the details. In it Mary was a miracle baby: Her parents, Joachim and Anna, were elderly, but Anna prayed to God for a child, and Mary appeared on the scene. Later her grateful mother dedicated her to God's service in the Temple. Is this beginning to sound familiar? Like a child coming to the older Abraham and Sarah, a

Take Five for Faith possibility so unbelievable Sarah laughed at the news? Or the childless Zechariah and Elizabeth, who had John the Baptist? Or

Jesus himself? All these stories point to the hand of God in the unlikely birth of a person destined for service to the God for whom nothing is impossible. Might God be preparing an unexpected possibility for you?

✤<u>Thursday, November 22</u> Thanksgiving Day

In a famous experiment, two scientists made a video of people throwing basketballs to each other and asked viewers to count the number of times the people wearing white tossed the ball. The result was that 50 percent of viewers completely missed the woman in the gorilla suit who walked right through the middle of the scene! Jesus knew, 2,000 years before the term *inattentional blindness* was coined, that we see what we pay attention to and largely miss the rest. Today, as you sit down for your Thanksgiving meal, pause and consider what you might not be seeing: Perhaps the abundance of goodness in your life?

"Viva Cristo Rey!"—"Long live Christ the King!" Not an unusual expression for Christians to use but remarkable when they are the last words a person ever speaks. Blessed Miguel Agustín Pro (1891-1927) said these words after forgiving the people who were about to put him to death for a crime he didn't commit. They reflect the life of a man who gave his life and death to God. Though only 36, Miguel had become a Jesuit priest, worked with miners in Belgium, and then returned to his homeland of Mexico. There he continued to minister covertly because the authorities of the time openly persecuted Catholics in his state. As you reflect on your own life, what few words might you use to sum up your life's message?

Feast of St. Andrew Dung-Lac & companions

Why do Catholics revere the church's many martyrs? Some folks from other traditions might view the practice as a glorification of death. In fact it represents the opposite: A recognition that life is the most precious gift of God and that those who freely offer that gift to the entire church for the sake of witness are indeed worthy of reverence. Martyrdom is the ultimate act of generosity, and the Vietnamese martyrs the church commemorates today stand in a long line of gift -givers. Offer a moment of quiet prayer this Thanksgiving weekend to those who have gifted you.
