



Second Quarter payments are due on/before June 30





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## **Apostles Peter and Paul**

One of the oldest saints' days in Rome, June 29, was dedicated to the memory of the apostles Peter and Paul as early as the fourth century. This day the church remembers two disciples who differed greatly in style and background, but who shared a tireless energy in spreading the gospel.



Rough-hewn and impulsive Peter left his fishing nets immediately to answer Jesus' call. Later, during the passion of Jesus, Peter made his denials just as impulsively, though he had pledged his loyalty to Jesus

only that evening. Receiving Christ's gracious forgiveness after the resurrection, Peter went on to become the rock-steady and faithful leader of the disciples. Imprisoned three or four times, he eventually was crucified during the reign of Nero. Legend has it that he was hung on the cross head down because he told the soldiers that he was not worthy to die in the same manner as Christ.

Once Paul, who had been a rigid and violent persecutor of Christians, experienced the love of Christ, he grew meek—though never shy. He founded many churches and was able to affirm the fledgling communities of believers even while he was admonishing them. Paul's writings are the first Christian scriptures; they are older than the gospels. After many imprisonments, Paul was executed during the reign of Nero. Since he was a Roman citizen, he was beheaded instead of crucified.

Coastal countries like Chile and Paraguay remember Peter the fisherman with nautical parades. In Hungary and in rural England, people braid straw from the wheat harvest into crosses and crowns to honor the two martyr saints.





## June 29, 2014 America's First Freedom: Religious Liberty

"What some saw as a drift toward imposing a pagan world view on us all is in fact a determined, well organized and well healed effort to change the social mores of our country and to impose their secular values and their anti religious biases on the lives of millions of God fearing Americans." — Bishop William Murphy

As the media surrounds us with assurances that we Catholics are intolerant and heartless when we hold to the beliefs of our faith and its teachings, and as the secular view is presented as warm and compassionate, remember the warning of one of America's founders, Samuels Adams, "*How strangely will the tool of the tyranny pervert the plain meaning of words*."

In his book, *Render Unto Caesar*, Archbishop Chaput writes, "We need to be very forceful in clarifying what the words in our political vocabulary really mean. Words are important because they shape our thinking, and our thinking drives our actions. When we subvert the meaning of words like "the common good" or "conscience" or "community" or "family," we undermine the language that sustains our thinking about the law. Dishonest language leads to dishonest debate and bad laws."

"Here's an example. We need to remember that tolerance is not a Christian virtue. Charity, justice, mercy, prudence, honesty -- these are Christian virtues. And obviously, in a diverse community, tolerance is an important working principle. But it's never an end itself. In fact, tolerating grave evil within a society is itself a form of serious evil. Likewise, democratic pluralism does not mean that Catholics should be quiet in public about serious moral issues because of some misguided sense of good manners. A healthy democracy requires vigorous moral debate to survive. Real pluralism demands that people of strong beliefs will advance their convictions in the public square -- peacefully, legally and respectfully, but energetically and without embarrassment. Anything less is bad citizenship and a form of theft from the public conversation."

Also in his writing Archbishop Chaput wrote of the "importance of Catholics witnessing their faith vigorously in public life – not simply as a matter of good citizenship, but also as an obligation of the Gospel." If we know the truth of the source and intent of America's Constitutional freedoms and know the truth of the Bible and our Church, we can speak those truths and teach them to others. Then we will give witness to our faith so openly and confidently that we become examples of the faithful Americans our founders envisioned and the good stewards of the gifts of freedom from our Father in heaven.

## Take Five for Faith

#### Sunday, June 29: Solemnity of St. Peter and St. Paul

One was a missionary to the Jewish world, the other to the Gentiles. Both were apostles: among the original witnesses to Jesus and his gospel. One knew the Lord face-to-face, the other, like each and every Christian since, knew him by faith. Both at one time or another either denied their connection to Jesus or persecuted his followers; they also ran afoul of authorities and were martyred in the same place at about the same time. Saints Peter and Paul serve as examples of both great heroism and very human weakness. Read the Acts of the Apostles or one of their letters in the New Testament to hear their wise and courageous words.

#### Monday, June 30: Memorial of the First Martyrs of the Church of Rome

Rome is a city of enchantment. Twenty centuries ago as the center of an immense empire it was the pride of its citizenry and a lamp of culture and tolerance for the known world. Imagine the horror in 64 A.D. when a fire raged across this great capital for six days and destroyed 70 percent of it, leaving half the population homeless. Needing a scapegoat, Emperor Nero implicated the Christians. Some were burned alive, others decapitated, crucified, or ripped apart by wild animals. How ready are you to assign blame to whole communities when devastation kindles your outrage?

#### Tuesday, July 1: Memorial of St. Junípero Serra

A Spanish conquistador said of the early Franciscan missionary to the New World Blessed Junípero Serra: "There is no mischief he will not attempt if exasperated." His ingenuity was evident when a group of native peoples attacked a mission where he was staying, and he went out to face them alone, armed only with a barrel organ he was playing. The attackers stopped, listened, and then went away, somehow persuaded that violence was not the solution that day. People then and now are complicated, full of negative and positive impulses. Try to follow what Abraham Lincoln called "the better angels of our nature."

#### Wednesday, July 2

The motto of the Benedictine religious order family, *ora et labora*, "prayer and work," sums up the main activities of monastic life. Their pairing also shows how one is present in the other: Prayer is a work—something deserving of serious effort—and work is to be prayerful, done in a spirit of care and attentiveness. The formula also applies to those who don't live in monasteries. Prayer is a worthy activity, and it should lead to active works of mercy, while all the work you do should be grounded in an awareness of God.

#### Thursday, July 3: Feast of St. Thomas

Sacred art is a prayerful way to enter into the stories of scripture, the mysteries of the faith, and the lives of the saints. Compelling images such as Caravaggio's masterpiece *The Incredulity of Saint Thomas* (1601-1602) will leave no doubt in your mind that stories can come alive and offer insights, questions, and inspirations to bring to your prayer and reflection. Look up this painting and notice how Jesus himself draws Thomas close. This gesture can be a reminder of how even in your own doubts and misgivings, God is drawing close to you.

#### <u>First Friday, July 4</u>

Amidst the barbecues and summer fun today, take a moment to ask if what you celebrate might better be called *interdependence* rather than *independence*. Whatever freedoms you enjoy are conditioned on your need for others and for all of God's creation. As the poet John Donne reminded us, no one is an island. There is no such thing as complete freedom—and if there were, it would be lonely indeed. So enjoy the fireworks but also look at the faces around you. Without all of them, it wouldn't be much of a celebration, would it? Give thanks for your interdependence today!

#### First Saturday, July 5: Memorial of St. Elizabeth of Portugal

If you had a relative who was a saint, would you be more likely to view such a choice as a family calling? Like her great-aunt Elizabeth of Hungary, Elizabeth of Portugal embraced a life of prayer and charity. And like her aunt, she married young into a royal household. While the elder Elizabeth enjoyed a happy marriage, the younger suffered the anguish of an unfaithful husband and a regicidal son. Both Elizabeths were banished from their courts for a time and became Third-Order Franciscans after the deaths of their husbands. It is good to be queen enshrined in the hearts of the poor!

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
