



Prayers

Why Call Names?

I was walking past a schoolyard and the kids were hanging out waiting for the bell to ring to start the school day. As kids will, some little third-grader was taunting another one. She said, "Why should I listen to you? You're just a dork."


For the gazillionth time one kid put down another kid by trying to demean and diminish who they are. Adults do it, too. In fact it was an adult in the synagogue where Jesus was teaching who cried out, "What have you to do with us, Jesus of Nazareth?"

It may not seem as though the name, "Jesus of Nazareth" is a put-down. But in this case it was. The unclean spirit in this man obviously recognized that this teacher spoke with the authority of God. And he wanted to diminish that power by limiting Jesus to his human identity. Rather than calling him Jesus, Son of God, he wanted him to be simply Jesus of Nazareth, a regular Joe like anyone else.

He wasn't just Jesus of Nazareth, he was also Jesus, Son of God. His origins were not just a sleepy town in Judea. His origins were in God's own self. And as the Son of God, Jesus came to liberate us from the unclean spirits that plague us all—even the unclean spirit that wants to put others down.

Feast of St Blaise: Wednesday, February 3

Due to COVID-19 restrictions and guidelines, there will be no individual Blessings of throats; rather, a General Blessing will follow the Prayer after Communion, much like Mother's and Father's Day. This general blessing of throats will take place on **Sunday, January 31** at all Masses in anticipation of the Feast Day and after 8am Mass **February 3**.

On Ash Wednesday, February 17, ashes will be distributed by sprinkling them over one's head so as to make it contactless. Ashes will NOT be imposed on foreheads this year to avoid contamination of the priest or ministers and congregants. Ashes will be distributed inside the church at **8am Mass and 12:15pm Mass,** and at two **Word Services outside the front of the Church at 4:30pm and 5:30pm with distribution of Ashes from 4:30pm to 5pm and 5:30pm to 6pm**. * Ministers will be at the main entrance of the Church. Entry into the Church is not required, however you may come in for private prayer, if you wish. **Please Note*: You may stop by anytime within the "outside" time frame to receive ashes, perhaps on your way home from work. **†**

Ordinary Time: Winter A Sense of the Season

What do the words Ordinary Time mean? Dorothy Day said, "The words 'Ordinary Time' in our prayer books put me in a state of confusion and irritation. To me, no time is ordinary." She was right. The Ordinary in Ordinary Time refers to ordinal—counted—time, not to a lack of something to celebrate. The Roman document, General Norms for the Liturgical Year and Calendar, says: "Apart from those seasons having their own distinctive character [Advent, Christmastime, Lent, Triduum and Eastertime], 33 or 34 weeks remain in the yearly cycle that do not celebrate a specific aspect of the mystery of Christ. Rather, especially on the Sundays, they are devoted to the mystery of Christ in all its aspects." (#43)

How do we celebrate "the mystery of Christ in all its aspects"? We gather every Sunday. Sunday is our original feast day. Christians have gathered every Sunday—the day of Christ's resurrection, the first day of the week—ever since there were Christians.

Each year there are two blocks of Ordinary Time, one in the winter between Christmastime and Lent, and the other in summer and fall, from Pentecost through Christ the King. When we gather on Sundays in Ordinary Time, as always, we hear the scriptures proclaimed. We systematically read through the gospels. The first readings from the first testament of the Bible were chosen for their relationship to the gospel passages. The second readings come from the various letters of the second testament of the Bible. The mystery of Christ "in all its aspects" unfolds.

What is the heart of our Sunday celebration? We do our eucharist; that is, we do our thanksgiving. We praise and thank God for all creation; we pray for the whole world, as we remember Christ's life, death and resurrection. We share the bread and wine, the body and blood. We are sent forth to be the body and blood of Christ in our homes, our workplaces, our neighborhoods, our towns, our cities, our country, our world.

"What happens in our churches every Sunday is the fruit of our week. What happens as the fruit of the week past is the beginning of the week to come. Sunday is simultaneously a point of arrival and departure for Christians on their way to the fullness of the kingdom. This is not ordinary at all. This is the fabric of Christian living." (St. Andrew Bible Missal [Brooklyn: Wm. J. Hirten Co., 1982.]).

Saint Blaise Blessing: February 3



Sickness and suffering are mysteries that confront most Christians at some time in their lives.

Believers cherish the stories of Jesus' tender concern for the poor and sick who sought to find relief and meaning in their struggles.

The flesh-andblood example of a long line of Christian witnesses whose faith sustained them in time of trial offers us hope when shadows darken our lives.

Saint Blaise was such a person.

Blaise served as bishop of Armenia in the fourth century. Little is known about his life, but tradition tells us that he saved a small boy from choking on a fish bone. Because of this, his help is sought for those who are sick, especially those who are afflicted with illnesses of the throat. On February 3, the feast of Saint Blaise, the church continues its ministry to the sick with the blessing of throats.

This blessing invokes God's healing and protection. Two blessed candles, joined in the form of a cross, are placed around the throat of each person seeking a blessing.* The minister then prays, "Through the intercession of Saint Blaise, bishop and martyr, may God deliver you from every disease of the throat and from every other illness: In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit." Humbled by physical weakness and human limitations, we acknowledge our faith in God's protective love for all who call upon God's name.
