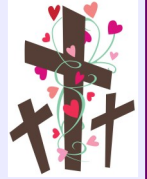

The Healers Hands

Our family doctor was brought to Chicago by Mother Cabrini herself to care for the growing Italian immigrant population. Ten months before I was born, my sister had died of polio at the age of 7. My mother was left struggling through a difficult pregnancy. The doctor reassured her that, despite the loss of her precious daughter, he would see to it that she delivered a healthy baby. She did. I, her fourth son, arrived. Six years later, I would receive the very first Salk polio vaccine that our doctor administered.

His office was always filled with patients. He never rushed. Over the years, he would spend time talking to me about my decision to become a priest. After my ordination, he would ask me about the evils in our world and express how they affected the physical as well as the spiritual health of the people. Years later he retired and eventually he himself grew ill.

During my last visit with him, as I anointed him with the sacrament of the Sick, I remembered how warm his hands felt when I was his patient. They were the hands of a healer—all the lives he touched, pain he removed, hope he restored, comfort he gave with them. I anointed those hands with the blessed oil. What a privilege it was. I told him what a great doctor he was. He smiled and said to me that, like Jesus, we are all called in life to be healers, each in our own way. Then he squeezed my hands one last time.

LENT BEGINS: Ash Wednesday, February 17

Ashes will be distributed by sprinkling them over one's head so as to make it contactless. Ashes will NOT be imposed on foreheads this year to avoid contamination of the priest or ministers and congregants. **Ashes will be distributed inside the Church at 8am Mass and 12:15pm Mass, and at two Word Services outside the Church at 4:30pm and 5:30pm with distribution of Ashes from 4:30pm to 5pm and 5:30pm to 6pm.** Ministers will be at the main entrance outside of the Church. Entry into the Church is not required, however you may go inside for private prayer, if you wish.

Please Note: you may stop by anytime within the "outside" time frame to receive ashes, perhaps on your way home from work.

LENT OBLIGATIONS: Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are obligatory days of fasting (ages 18 through 59) and abstinence (ages 14 and over) for Catholics. In addition, Fridays during Lent are obligatory days of abstinence. *-United States Conference of Catholic Bishops.*

There will be **STATIONS OF THE CROSS** every Friday at 7 pm during Lent, except Good Friday. †

He established the first missionary organization of the Vatican, the Congregation for the Propagation of the Faith. And he canonized these beloved saints: Ignatius of Loyola, Teresa of Avila, Francis Xavier, and Philip Neri. Is there a change you've been meaning to make in your own practice of the faith? God's assistance rains down

There are few details of Saint Scholastica's early life, but we do know that this sister of Benedict of Nursia entered religious life and lived in a women's monastery a few miles from her brother's in Monte Cassino.

Perhaps the most enduring story about Scholastica is one that pits her will against her brother's when she begs him to extend their yearly visit and spend the night in prayer and conversation. Benedict resists, not wishing to break his own rule with a night away from home. Determined, Scholastica asks God for assistance, and a torrential rainstorm ensues that settles the matter in her favor—Benedict will spend the night. Never doubt that you are worthy to ask for God's help. Trust your heart to know what will draw you closer to God.

Thursday, February 11: Our Lady of Lourdes

Turn to Mary

Much of Jesus' ministry had to do with some form of healing, and today's memorial, Our Lady of Lourdes, recognizes Mary's 18 reported appearances in Lourdes, France, a place of pilgrimage known for healing powers. Millions of people a year travel to Lourdes in search of healing; many report spiritual peace and transformation, and a handful even report experiencing cures without medical explanation. Today is also World Day of the Sick. It's an ideal day to ask Mary to intercede on behalf of healing that we need—or that our friends and loved ones desire.

Say their name

This day, falling between World Day of the Sick and Valentine's Day, brings thoughts of how many are left alone after COVID deaths. Advertisers are pushing candy, cards, and flowery bouquets, but the countercultural church also counsels that we pay kind attention to those who are grieving. Practical actions are often most helpful: not only shoveling a driveway or baking some bread, but also reaching out and just listening to whatever is on the grieving person's heart. Sometimes all a grieving person wants is to name the beloved and talk about them again. Being a good listener is a welcome gift.

Saturday, February 13: Blessed Virgin Mary

For more than a thousand years, the Catholic Church has dedicated most Saturdays to the Blessed Virgin Mary. The reason for choosing Saturday above all other days has been lost to antiquity. But according to tradition, Saturday has been set aside to celebrate the maternal example of Mary and witness to her dedicated discipleship as a woman of God and a follower of Jesus. The weekly memorial serves as a reminder that she is continuously present and operative in the life of the church. Reflect on how the Blessed Virgin Mary has been present and active in your life.

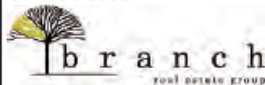

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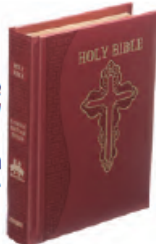
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
