

Ten Years of Unmerited Favor

"Who am I, O Lord GOD, and what is my lineage that you have brought me thus far" (2 Sam. 7:8).

It is with gratitude to the Most Holy Trinity and the Blessed Virgin Mary that I celebrate the 10^{th} anniversary of my Priestly Ordination. It is truly ten years of unmerited favor.

It was on August 4th, 2012 (Feast of St. John Mary Vianney patron of priests) that I was ordained a Catholic priest by Most Rev. Richard E. Pates (bishop emeritus of Des Moines Diocese, Iowa, U.S.A). On that day, a mere mortal like me was configured into the person of Christ - "in persona Christi" to represent Christ in the celebration and administration of the Sacraments and to mediate and be a bridge between God and humanity. Hence, the universal church teaches, "It is the same priest, Christ Jesus, whose sacred person his minister truly represents. Now the minister, by reason



of the sacerdotal consecration which he has received, is truly made like to the high priest ad possesses the authority to act in the power and place of the person of Christ himself" (*virtute ac persona ipsitus Christi, cf CCC1548*). What an unmerited favor!

For these ten years God, through the intercession of Our Mother of Perpetual Help, has been so generous and merciful to me - blessing my little efforts with success and protecting me from harm. It suffices to say that I am a living testimony of Divine Mercy. Worthy of note was the ghastly car accident I had on February 22nd, 2017 that ought to have claimed my life. It was a collision between a Toyota Camry (my car) and a heavy duty vehicle; my car damaged badly that one would hardly believe the driver came out alive, but I came out without a single cut or fracture. What an unmerited favor!

Through this miraculous event, I realized more that GOD IS ALL, MAN IS NOTHING (Libermann). I would have been dead and even long buried but God, through the intercession of our Mother of Perpetual Help, out of His infinite mercy, gave me another chance to live. Another chance to fulfill more of His purpose for creating me - to love Him by loving my neighbor, and in a special way as a priest, to win souls for Him in order to merit being with Him perpetually in heaven.

The major purpose of our creation can only be effectively achieved through prayer and charity. To love God, we must be close to God by developing personal relationships with Him. Moreover, to be truly successful and fulfilled in life, we must be in constant communication with God through prayer. This is basically due to our constant need of divine grace for cut off from Him we can do absolutely nothing (Jn 15:5).

These ten years would not have been a huge success without the intercession of our Mother of Perpetual Help, to whom I dedicated my priesthood. In gratitude for her unconditional intercession, I reconsecrate my life and vocation to her Immaculate Heart. To my patron saints, I owe eternal debt of gratitude. To my biological mother and siblings, I am grateful. To the all the worshiping community of St. Boniface Martyr, especially Fr. Kevin Dillon (immediate past pastor), Fr. Josef Norys (pastor), Fr Azubuike Igbegwe, the nuns and the entire parish, I say thanks a bunch! May God continue to bless you abundantly and exceedingly beyond your imagination.

Finally, I ask for your prayers, especially for the grace of holiness and fidelity to God. May the celebration of the 10th Anniversary of my Priestly Ordination, bring all of us God's abundant divine favors, through Christ our Lord. Amen!

Sunday, July 31, 2022

Do you ever feel like the world is spinning out of control? You're not alone: Pope Francis has called this effect of modern culture "rapidification." It's not just you: Things really are happening, progressing, and becoming obsolete faster—including what many of us do for a living. We're not unlike the tragic lamplighter in Catholic author Antoine de Saint-Exupéry's classic, The Little Prince. The lamplighter's planet is turning faster, but he still operates at the same mortal speed. He must now respond to 1,440 sunsets where there used to be just one. Now more than ever, we need to honor our Sabbaths and take our rest.

Monday, August 1: St. Alphonsus Liguori

Alphonsus Liguori is the patron saint of many things, including the work of laypeople. Even though he was a founder of a religious order, the Redemptorists, he was, of course, first a layperson himself—and one with a successful career. A lawyer who didn't lose a case for eight years straight, he still found time in his busy schedule to visit the terminally ill, which is how he discovered his true vocation and became a priest and leading theologian. Liguori might be the first to advise: Take a break from work to give back to the community and you might find your mission.

Tuesday, August 2: St. Peter Julian Eymard

Peter Julian Eymard, the French Catholic priest who founded the Congregation of the Blessed Sacrament, had a deep love and understanding of the Eucharist. "How kind is our Sacramental Jesus! He welcomes you at any hour of the day or night. His Love never knows rest," he said. "When you visit Him, He forgets your sins and speaks only of His joy, His tenderness, and His Love. By the reception He gives to you, one would think He has need of you to make Him happy." Take such words to heart.

Wednesday, August 3

Sor Isolina Ferré Aguayo, M.S.B.T., a Missionary Sister, died on this day in 2000 after a lifetime of service to the poor of her native Puerto Rico and New York. Known as the "Mother Teresa of Puerto Rico," Aguayo served people living on the margins and opened schools and resource centers throughout Puerto Rico and beyond. She received 17 honorary degrees and more than 50 additional awards including the Presidential Medal of Freedom in 1999, for "her passionate fight against poverty, violence, and despair in Puerto Rico and Brooklyn, New York, where she worked to reconcile rival gangs in 1950-1960." In endowing the award, President Clinton said Sor Isolina taught people "to see the best in themselves and in their communities." May we all serve so well.

Thursday, August 4: St. John Vianney

Sometimes a vocation comes packaged with obstacles. Perhaps it is God's way of testing our resolve. In any case, John Vianney, born in revolutionary France in 1786, modeled persistence in his determination to become a priest. His religious training was disrupted by the anticlerical reign of terror unleashed during the French Revolution. Priests in hiding who risked their lives to administer the sacraments became Vianney's heroes, and once the church was reestablished, Vianney entered seminary. Today we know him as the patron saint of parish priests. May his story inspire us to overcome obstacles that keep us from our God-given vocation, whatever that might be.

Friday, August 5: Dedication of Mary Major Basilica

Christians first gathered in homes, or "house churches," before there were dedicated religious buildings. Remember the "upper room" where the disciples received the gift of the Holy Spirit? It was likely one of the first house churches. As Christians were able to more freely express their faith, churches were built. One of the most historic and significant churches is the Basilica of Mary Major in Rome. It was built out of deep love of Mary and her significance in salvation history. It holds many important relics, works of art, and the sacred experiences of pilgrims since the fifth century. What is a church that has been especially meaningful for you?

Saturday, August 6

On August 6, 1945 at 8:15 in the morning, an atomic bomb exploded above Hiroshima, Japan, dropped from an American B-29 bomber. In an instant some 70,000 souls were incinerated by the 10,000-degree fireball generated in the blast. By the end of the year, injury and radiation doubled the total number of deaths. Seventy-five years later, Pope Francis declared the use of atomic weapons, even the mere possession of such devices, to be immoral. Reflect on the transfigured Christ who stands in solidarity with the suffering and dead of all crimes against humanity.
