

Mass Times

One of my first priorities as your new pastor has been to try to get to know St Boniface and to get to know as many of you as possible. To that end, I have had individual conversations with many of you over these last six weeks, and so far, they have all been very productive and informative. I am still desperately trying to learn names, so I ask for your continued patience on that front! You have all been very positive, welcoming, and have made me feel at home here at St Boniface. Thank You!!

In these conversations, many of you have asked me: "When are we going back to the old mass schedule?" After investigating further, and getting feedback from as many people as possible, I have come to the following conclusions:



- 1. None of our three masses on Sunday are particularly full so it doesn't seem like there is a need for all three.
- 2. Having three masses on Sunday, one after the other, seems to be hindering our ability to have community-oriented events on Sunday.
- 3. Getting rid of the 8:00 AM mass seems to have inconvenienced a lot of people.

I think that going back to having only two masses on Sunday, one at 8:00 AM and one at 10:30 AM makes a whole lot of sense and I think it would be greatly beneficial to the parish. Our early-birds would be happy to have their 8:00 AM mass back and we could revive our Family CCD Program after the 8:00 AM mass and our Hospitality (coffee and sweets) after the 10:30 AM mass, among other things. But, before I make such a significant change, I want to ask you all what you think. Please let me know if you like this idea or if you have concerns about it. I am thinking of implementing this change at the beginning of the school year, which is coming up soon, so please let me know what you're thinking as soon as possible. If I don't hear from you, I am going to assume that you are in favor.

Homily Story

Look for the Lesson

A guy in my men's group greets any new challenge in his life by asking, "Where's the lesson to be learned here?" He'll say this when things go poorly at work, when he struggles with members of his family, or even when something tragic will happen. I admire his courage and resilience. There are times when I just don't want any more of life's "lessons." But they continue to come. The question is what will we make of them?

Saint Paul echo's my friend's message when he says, "Endure your trials as discipline." Discipline is empty if we don't learn the lesson. If you don't get chosen for a promotion, the lesson might be that other parts of your life can provide the riches you are seeking.

If someone slanders you, the lesson may be that it's more important to be convinced inside that you are worthy than to rely on the opinions of others.

I once messed up on a project at work because I had become a one-man-band, asking for no help and accepting none that was offered. Even when I saw things falling apart, I simply held the reins tighter and stayed to myself. When my failure became apparent I felt horrible. I could continue on my self-destructive path or do what was hard for me: ask my colleagues for help. My failure turned into a great blessing.

So when life's trials, difficulties, and disappointments come your way, ask yourself, "Where's the lesson?"

Sunday, August 21, 2022

If you've ever been locked out even once because you forgot your key, chances are you now check your pockets before you step outside the door. Being on the wrong side of a barred door is tough when it's due to hapless error. It's positively brutal when a door remains shut in your face because of something you did or failed to do. We've all received the key to a warm welcome at the threshold of God's realm: love. Church-going and check-writing may be basic but not key. The door opens to those whose hearts are open. Wherever you go today, check your pockets for love.

Monday, August 22: *Memorial of the Queenship of the Blessed Virgin Mary*

In many ancient cultures, including Israel's, it wasn't the wife of the king who was queen. Rather, the mother of the king was queen. And while her son was the unquestionable ruler, she often had tremendous influence over him. The same goes in heaven. Today's memorial is eight days—an octave—after celebrating Mary's Assumption. Pope Pius XII, who declared the dogma of the Assumption, said of his instituting the feast of Mary's Queenship, "so that all may recognize more clearly and venerate more devoutly the merciful and maternal sway of the Mother of God." Remember to hail your queen, Mary, today.

Tuesday, August 23: Optional Memorial

of St. Rose of Lima — like her saintly role model before her, Catherine of Siena—proved that you didn't need to become a nun to live a notable life of Christian piety and service. Both women were drawn to holiness at a young age, both resisted their parents' pressure to marry, both even took measures to make themselves less attractive to suitors. Each joined the lay Dominicans. Rose sought a sacrificial life as she brought home needy people to care for, saying, "When we serve the poor and the sick, we serve Jesus." How will you serve Jesus today?

Wednesday, August 24: Feast of St. Bartholomew

Elisabeth Kübler-Ross died on this date in 2004. Early in her medical training, she was horrified to see the term "hopeless patient" commonly applied to the terminally ill, who were often overly sedated and neglected. She went on to transform the way we look at terminal illness. A pioneer in hospice and palliative care, bioethics, and near-death research,

she led the movement to "treat the dying with dignity." Her 1969 classic <u>On Death and Dying</u> changed the way we look at grief. Perhaps appropriate that today is also the feast of Saint Bartholomew, the apostle famed for his painful death as a martyr. We can all play a part in bringing comfort and dignity to the dying process.

Thursday, August 25: Optional Memorial of St. Joseph Calasanz — who is now widely recognized for his devotion to educating needy students. However, during his 17th-century lifetime Joseph encountered strong resistance. His family opposed his becoming a priest, and after he had founded innovative schools for the poor and the Piarist religious community to tend those schools, enemies attacked. In his 80s, the church removed Joseph from education leadership, and dissolved the Piarists. After his death, the Piarists were restored, and they continue their education ministry around the world today. If you struggle with a seeming failure, look to the life of Saint Joseph of Calasanz for a model of faithfulness and endurance.

Friday, August 26

There's a lot of talk right now. Talk about gun control, women's rights, dismantling racism—or not. The conversations are urgent yet often feel futile. What we need, writes Father Raimon Panikkar, whose anniversary of death is today, is not talk, but dialogue. Dialogue "is not a simple conversation, not a mere mutual enrichment by the supplementary information that is contributed; it is not exclusively a corrective of misunderstandings . . . It is the joint search for the shared and the different." How can you foster this kind of dialogue that nourishes what each person contributes?

Saturday, August 27: Memorial of St. Monica

At some point or another, each of us loses our way in life. Some only briefly, others for a long time. Sadly, some never find their way home. But if we are blessed with someone as special as Saint Monica, we might be fortunate enough to share the fate of her famous son, Saint Augustine. He wrote in his Confessions that she had "brought me to birth, both in her flesh, so that I was born into this temporal light, and in her heart, that I might be born into eternal light." Give thanks for the people in your life who never stopped believing in you.

Sunday Scripture Reflections

First Reading ~ Inviting All People

The greatest music ever written appeals to people of every culture. People who do not speak a common language can all enjoy the same music. If the music is well written, it will touch the spirit of any human. The same can be said of architecture, sculpture, and painting. People of all cultures connect with the same treasures. This is also true of many sports, like soccer, and athletic achievements, like running a marathon. It is also true of the Gospel. The message of Jesus Christ appeals to believers all over the world because it proclaims the news that all can be saved. In the prophecy of Isaiah, God promised to gather together people of every language. Representatives from Israel would go to foreign nations and distant coastlands. Foreigners would hear about God and would come back to Jerusalem to make an offering there. New leaders would be raised up from these foreigners. It is a bold vision proclaiming the universality of God's intent. In both the Old and New Testaments, it slowly became evident that God intended to invite all people of all nations into a holy relationship. How do you help God's work? Do you know the names of people at church? Do you invite your neighbors and friends? Do you introduce yourself to newcomers? Anyone can understand the Christian message, but first it must be heard.

Second Reading ~ For Your Own Good

"You'll thank me for this one day." Oh, how a kid hates to hear those words. They often accompany some punishment that kids have to put up with until they get older. Kids seethe under those words. They do not make any sense. They take away fun. And they make them mad. But those words are usually right. Maybe that adds to the frustration. We all hate to do what is "for our own good" when it feels like it is anything but. We do not like being told we did the wrong thing. We do not like to be punished. And we do not like being told to fix our attitude about punishment. So when the Letter to the Hebrews says God treats us like children, it doesn't quite sound like good news. The author recalls a quote from the Old Testament. It is enough to make you wince: "My son, do not disdain the discipline of the Lord or lose heart when reproved by him; for whom the Lord loves, he disciplines; he scourges every son he acknowledges." So, here is the advice we get: "Endure your trials as 'discipline." We would rather not have to endure trials at all. But when they come, we are supposed to endure them. "At the time, all discipline seems a cause not for joy but for pain, yet later it brings the peaceful fruit of righteousness." We do not like hearing it, but it is true: Some day we will thank God for these trials.

Gospel ~ "Strive to enter through the narrow gate, for many, I tell you, will attempt to enter but will not be strong enough." LUKE 13:24

What does this Gospel line tell us? It reveals that we cannot enter Heaven by our own will or through our own effort. Furthermore, it tells us that though some will try to get to Heaven through their own effort, this approach will not work. Upon meeting our Lord, after death, they will be surprised that they are not a member of His Kingdom.

This clear and somewhat shocking statement from our Lord should have the effect of causing you to step back and look at your life so as to sincerely and humbly examine the path you are on. Jesus' directness and clarity on this real experience that some will have should help to open your eyes so as to honestly examine if He is speaking about you.

It takes true humility to face the truth, at times, and to admit if we are trying to rely more upon ourselves than upon Christ. The "narrow gate" is that gate through which the humble enter. Pride and self-sufficiency lead us to attempt to make our own path to Heaven. But this path is never the correct one.

Entering the "narrow gate" also means that we listen to God. He, as the divine Shepherd, is always calling to us in a gentle way. Only when we are attentive to His voice will we know where He is leading us. Only then will we discover the way through the one and only narrow gate.

Reflect, today, upon that moment when you meet our Lord face to face. What will that encounter be like? Will it be one where He greets you with open arms saying, "Well done, good and faithful servant, enter into your reward." Or will it be one in which He says, "I do not know you." Now is the time to face your life of faith with honesty, striving to rely only upon the strength of our divine Lord.

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
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
