



The City of Gladness

There is little comfort in Jerusalem. Our generation has witnessed great tragedies in the Holy Land. Holy sites have been destroyed. Suicide bombers have killed innocents. People live in terror.

Efforts for peace rise and fall. Other nations seek a way for Jerusalem to find its peace. The city is important to many of the world's believers. It deserves to be a place of peace, an example of righteousness, a beacon of justice for anyone who longs for these virtues.

When Isaiah first spoke his prophecy about Jerusalem, the city lay in ruins, ravaged by invaders, its citizens carried off into exile. He heard the voice of God promise a better future for the city. "I will spread prosperity over Jerusalem like a river... In Jerusalem you shall find your comfort."

Those words still resonate deep within the hearts of all who hear them. We yearn to believe that God will bless Jerusalem with the peace and security promised so long ago.

When the day finally arrives, when all the world finds its comfort in Jerusalem, there will be great rejoicing. Scar Tissue

"Would you like to see my scar?" We hear this question from some people who have had surgery, scraped the road from their motorcycle, or suffered a wound in war. Sometimes they are more anxious to show it than we are to see it.


The reverse happens too. We would like to see a scar, but the person—for private reasons— chooses not to show it.

We all carry scars. Some are physical and quite visible. Others are well concealed. Some scars are emotional. They make themselves known even when we wish they did not. And some of our scars make us who we are. They are signs of our resilience, of the ill-intent of enemies, of moments of foolishness, or of times of unimaginable bravery. For some of us, our biography is the story of our scars.

St. Paul tells the Galatians, "I bear the marks of Jesus on my body." Paul had his share of physical and emotional pain, and he carried scars. They were not signs of hurt and pain, not signs of foolishness or bravery, not signs of illness or treachery. They were signs of Jesus. Because of Jesus, Paul endured all things. His scars told less about the tenacity of Paul and more about the faithfulness of Christ.

Where are your scars? What do they represent? Whom do they represent? Do you conceal them? Or do you ask, "Would you like to see my scar?"

Life, Legacy & Homecoming of Fr. Emil Kapaun

Kapaun died in a prisoner of war camp on May 23, 1951, his body wracked by pneumonia and dysentery.

On April 11, 2013, President Barack Obama awarded the legendary chaplain, credited with saving hundreds of soldiers during the Korean War, the Medal of Honor posthumously.

NEW HAVEN, Connecticut — The Knights of Columbus announced the release of *The Magazine and the Miracle: Finding Father Kapaun*, a short documentary film highlighting the extraordinary life and legacy of Servant of God, U.S. Army Chaplain and Medal of Honor recipient Father Emil Kapaun.

Father Kapaun's heroism, selfless service to his country, and devotion to Jesus Christ and the Catholic faith were a daily inspiration to his fellow soldiers during World War II and the Korean War.

The 15-minute film, produced by the Knights of Columbus, also traces the incredible journey of Father Kapaun's mortal remains, from a shallow grave in the prisoner-of-war camp where he died in May 1951, to an unmarked tomb in the National Memorial Cemetery of the Pacific in Honolulu's Punchbowl Crater in 1954, to his final resting place, at the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception in Wichita, Kansas, in 2021.

Father Kapaun, a native of Kansas, first served in the Diocese of Wichita following his ordination in 1940. The Magazine and the Miracle shares how in 2003 a Korean war veteran, William Hansen, visited a VA medical clinic in Naples, Florida, and stumbled upon a copy of a Knights of Columbus magazine — believed to be the March 2003 issue of Columbia, which featured an article about Father Kapaun. Hansen immediately recognized the beloved chaplain and recalled burying him in the prisoner of war camp. His testimony then became a significant factor that led to the eventual discovery and identification of Father Kapaun's remains in Hawaii.

Father Kapaun was named a Servant of God in 1993, and his cause for canonization opened in 2008. In addition, Father Kapaun was posthumously awarded the Medal of Honor in 2013. He is one of only five 20th-century chaplains to receive the military's highest award for valor.

Today, there are 23 Knights of Columbus councils and assemblies named in Father Kapaun's honor, beginning with Father Kapaun Council 3423 in his hometown of Pilsen, Kansas, which was chartered shortly after his death in 1951.
