

Hymn: "Honor St. Boniface"

Honor to St. Boniface (sung to the tune "Faith of Our Fathers")

1. O St. Boniface, our patron saint, In serving God he was not faint! As a young boy he studied hard, Then gave his life unto the Lord.

Refrain: Honor to Boniface today! As for our church his help we pray!

- 2. To cold dark Germany he was sent, Bringing God's Word, in joy he went. Finding the folk a pagan lot, God's love and care for them he taught. (*Refrain*)
- 3. Challenging falsehood was his task; Faith in God's Truth was all he asked. When he chopped down the mighty tree Death as a martyr was his fee. (*Refrain*)
- 4. Our forebears gave this church his name, Rememb'ring deeds that were not tame. He gave them hope and vision grand. How blest are we with them to stand! (*Refrain*).

Who is St. Boniface?

This great apostle of Germany was born in England, between 672 and 680. When he was small, some missionaries stayed a while at his home. They told the boy all about their work and impressed Boniface because they were so happy and excited about bringing the Good News to people. Boniface decided in his heart that he would be just like them when he grew up. While still young, he went to a monastery school to be educated. Some years later, he became a popular teacher. When he was ordained a priest, he was a powerful preacher because he was so full of enthusiasm.

Boniface wanted everyone to have the opportunity to know about and love Jesus and his Church. He became a missionary to the western part of Germany. Pope St. Gregory II blessed him and sent him on this mission. Boniface preached with great success. Once, to prove that the pre-Christian gods were false, he did a bold thing. There was a certain huge oak tree the local people believed was sacred to their gods. In front of a large crowd, Boniface struck the tree with an axe. The big tree crashed. The people were enlightened when realized that their gods took no action against Boniface.

In his lifetime, Boniface converted great numbers of people. In place of the statues of the pagan gods, he built churches and monasteries. In 732, the new pope, St. Gregory III made Boniface an archbishop and gave him another mission territory, Bavaria. He and some companions went there to teach the people about Christianity.

Then, one day, he was preparing to confirm some converts. A group of armed inhabitants swooped down on the camp. Boniface would not let his companions defend him. "Our Lord tells us to repay evil with good," he said. "The day has come for which I have waited



so long. Trust in God and he will save us." The warriors attacked, and Boniface was the first one killed. He died a martyr on June 5, 754. His wish, stated in his will, that he be buried at the famous monastery he had started at Fulda, Germany were carried out.

Did St. Boniface invent the Christmas Tree?

The specific origin of the Christmas tree is lost in the distant past. It may have started when pre-Christian rituals involving evergreen boughs were merged with Christian celebrations and beliefs. It seems to be generally recognized that the people who lived in what is now Germany were the first to develop the tradition of the Christmas tree. One tradition is that when Boniface cut down the famous oak tree that he was surprised to find a fir tree growing in its place. The fir was thereafter associated with the primacy of the Christian faith.

St. Boniface Martyr Parish History

In 1995, St. Boniface became a one priest parish when Father Camilleri (Reggie), who had won the hearts of parishioners in his seven years here, left St. Boniface to do further study. However, we gained **Sr. Kathleen Murphy**, **O.P.**, who was appointed pastoral associate and proved to be an invaluable asset to the parish as it continues to grow. Sr. Kathleen



assisted the pastor in the many aspects of running a parish and also conducted some liturgical services. Besides supporting parish programs already in existence, in 1996, Sr. Kathleen started a new program, M.O.M.S n' Tots, for mothers of preschoolers.

In 1996, the parish embarked on a diocesan Stewardship Program. Consciousness-raising on its theme of giving back time, talent and treasure in thanksgiving for all God has provided has been an impetus for parish growth. This program not only improved the parish's financial situation, but put new blood into volunteerism. Consequently, appreciation for the many gifts already shared within the parish community has grown among parishioners.

Our Parish at the start of the New Millennium

The dawn of St. Boniface Martyr Parish's second century began not long before the end of the 20th Century, as the Church prepared for the Jubilee Year declared for 2000 by Pope John Paul II. On Christmas Eve, 1998, the front doors of the church were closed and draped with a Jubilee Banner, by our then Pastor, Fr. Michael J. Torpey, to remain closed until Christmas Eve 1999, when they were ceremoniously reopened, just as the Pope opened the Holy Door at St. Peter's Basilica in Rome, to symbolize the Church's "Opening Wide the Doors to Christ" at the dawn of the Third Millennium.

The Internet Age

Our parish also marked the coming of the new millennium by becoming one of the first parishes on Long Island to establish a presence on the internet, launching a website at www.saintboniface.org, on October 15, 1999. With the rise of "social media", the parish also developed Facebook pages and used such tools as Twitter, Instagram, and a YouTube channel.

The weekly parish bulletin and newsletters were distributed digitally on these platforms and also sent by email to about 900 online subscribers. The parish's head-start in the world of digital communication was a blessing with the advent of the COVID-19 crisis and the need to provide safe live-streamed Masses and virtual replacements for face to face meetings and social activities curtailed by the crisis.

As St. Boniface Martyr Parish celebrated its Centennial in 1997 and 1998, and the Jubilee in 1999 and 2000, the same strong sense of community that had started this parish was still going strong. Many prayers and thanks go to those who have gone before us and have provided the faith community with all that it needed to sustain its first one hundred years. We pray that God



will continue to bless our parish, providing it with the gifts it needs to flourish in the future. In 2003,

Tom Fox became the first St. Boniface parishioner to be ordained a permanent Deacon, and continues to serve in that capacity. He was joined in the early years by the late Deacon **Ted Kolakowski**.

New Growth in a New Millenium

In June, 2007, St. Boniface bid a fond farewell to

Fr. Mike Torpey, who had been Pastor since 1989. Fr. Mike had led the parish through some momentous times, assisting in the founding of All Saints Regional Catholic School and helping parishioners explore their baptismal roles as Catholic Christians by helping them grow into new responsibilities as St. Boniface became a "one priest parish." That same month, St. Boniface welcomed a new




Pastor, **Fr. Robert A. Romeo**. St. Boniface was Fr. Bob's first assignment as Pastor of a parish, but he soon proved to be more than equal to the job and to be a great blessing to the parish, ushering in a renewed spirit and an era of great growth, much of which is detailed in this publication. Father Bob served as Pastor of St. Boniface Parish from June 21, 2007 to June 24, 2015, when he was assigned as the new Pastor of the Parish of St. Mary, Manhasset.

St. Boniface Martyr Parish History

Father Kevin Dillon

St. Boniface welcomed a new Pastor to Sea Cliff with the arrival of **Father Kevin Dillon**.

An energetic man with a passion for fitness and exercise, Father Kevin fit somewhat the same mold as Father Bob before him: a good Associate Pastor who



developed into a Great Pastor when assigned to his own parish at St. Boniface.


The parish came to know Father Kevin as a spirited homilist with a flair for connecting with his congregation by weaving relatable tales of his own day-to-day experiences into his talks.

The highlights of Father Kevin's stay with us were his inspired guidance during the COVID crisis and his assistance to the parish during the "listening process" stage of the current Synod.

Father Kevin helped us formulate a process for compiling and passing along information requested from local Churches around the world for consideration by those attending the Synod, called to meet in Rome in October of 2023.

Father Josef Norys, Can. Reg.

In addition to having a new Pastor, the appointment of Father Josef Norys, Can. Reg., to serve St. Boniface brought something new to the parish: leadership by a member of an order of Religious Priests.



Father Josef is a Canon Regular of St. Augustine and belongs to the Canonry of St. Leopold, a foundation of the Abbey of Klosterneuburg, Austria. The Canonry was founded in 2011, and its Canons have, since then, cared for the parishes of St. Patrick, St. Rocco and St. Hyacinth—neighboring parishes to St. Boniface Church.

Soon after being appointed Pastor by Bishop Barres on June 29, 2022 it became clear to the people of St. Boniface that he is a good listener and a charismatic man of action. Father made appointments, ministry heads, pastoral council members and anyone wishing to meet with him.

Through consultation with parishioners, Father Josef revised the Mass schedule, restored the Bell Choir, the Sunday Family Program and Hospitality after 10:30am Sunday Mass.

Until her recent retirement to her native Ireland, **Josie Harte** provided Hospitality after Mass and devoted much time to tending the garden in front of the church. **Kathleen Reynolds** is now in charge of Hospitality aided by her family and parish volunteers.

Father Josef hired the first Religious Education Assistant, Catechist Lorraine O'Sullivan, to assist the beloved and longtime Director of Religious Education, Karen Croce. Karen retired in June of 2023, and Lorraine is now St. Boniface's DRE. In addition, Father hired Cantor April Beisser Meier to reinstate the Youth Group.

In Father Josef's words, he is here "to celebrate the sacraments, to preach the Gospel, and to be a part of this faith community, growing together in our love for Jesus Christ and His Church."

Immediately after his arrival as our current Pastor, Father Josef invited the people of St. Boniface Martyr Parish to a "Meet the Pastor" reception after Mass to meet each other "as we begin this faith journey together. "As a parish under the patronage of St. Boniface Martyr, a storied missionary who traveled far from home to spread the faith and serve God's people, the fact that "We are a Pilgrim People on a Journey to the Kingdom of God" has long been one we, the people of St. Boniface, have held close to our hearts. As such , Father's reference to the life-long journey all Christians undertake struck a chord with us,

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
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
